

Undergraduate Education

The Office of the Provost, the Office of Community Engagement and Civic Learning (CECIL), and the Anti-Racist and Inclusive Excellence Task Force (ARIE) are pleased to announce that the 2023-2024 cycle of Impact Grant proposals is open. This year, we will be accepting proposals for both Curriculum Impact Grants and Course-based Impact Grants. We encourage proposals that develop anti-racist and inclusive curriculum, specifically those engaging with the <u>Quality Enhancement Plan</u>, Transformative Education through Anti-Racist Community Engagement, or the <u>curriculum and pedagogy goals</u> set by the <u>ARIE Task Force's Instructional Support Working Group</u>.

Curriculum Impact Grants must involve a programmatic curriculum change (at least three courses) at any degree level, while Course-based Impact Grants can be limited to a single course, at any degree level.
