Dear Colleagues,

Welcome, or welcome back, to teaching at Mason! If you are scheduled to teach a fully-online course in Spring 2021, or if you plan to incorporate online components into your teaching, [the Stearns Center Digital Learning Team](#) is here to help.

Please review the information and resources presented here as you prepare your Spring 2021 online courses. - **Webinars:** Visit our [website](#) for list of recorded webinars about online course design and teaching; Zoom and Collaborate Ultra; and about other Blackboard Tools. Throughout Spring semester, the Stearns Center Digital Learning Team will hold a series of webinars about specific topics for online teaching. Topics will include online course readiness & quality, alternative and





authentic assessments; engaging online learners, class engagement & interactions, accessibility; creating effective videos, etc. Please check the Stearns Center website regularly for updates on dates and registration.

(4) Syllabus Checklist: The syllabus sets the structure and tone for the course. It clearly defines student and instructor expectations. The Stearns Center website has information for [Designing Your Syllabus](#), including sample statements about academic integrity and accommodations for disabilities. We also include sample language for policies for new course structures and interactions. As you finalize the syllabus for your upcoming online course, review the [Online Syllabus Checklist](#) to ensure that it is complete. Your program or department might have specific guidelines for course syllabi, so check with them as well. As noted on the Stearns Center website, all syllabi ought to be made available to students on or before the first day of class and ought to minimally include basic information about you and the course, grading and course requirements, course-specific policies, your course schedule, and information on academic integrity, Title IX reporting and resources, and accommodations through Disability Services. Please remember to adjust for the new calendar, in which there is *no Spring Break week*; beyond shifting the dates, your Stearns Center colleagues encourage you to consider ways you can adapt your teaching to help your students (and yourself!) cope with the learning-marathon we are all engaged in this spring.

(5) Important Blackboard Changes: Starting January 4, 2021, there will be a new MyMason/Blackboard Navigation. Please note that the basic look and functionality of Blackboard courses and organization is not changing; but there are some changes. You may see the list of the [Blackboard changes](#) on ITS website.
