Virtual Teaching Squares

Stearns Center is exploring the option to create Virtual Teaching Squares for Fall 2020. In a typical teaching square, four faculty members each commit to a four-week period in which they

- each observe one meeting of the other three participants' courses, and
- schedule a coffee break at least once to share what they saw and talk about strategies they can all use (this is formative feedback, not supervisory judgment: what starts in the Teaching Square, stays in the Teaching Square).

As we re-imagine toward Virtual Teaching Squares, we can envision that participants could agree to share one of the following:

- an invitation to their Blackboard course site
- a copy of an assignment, course meeting plan, or plan to use a new educational tool
- a recording of a webcast class meeting
- a fundamental goal and/or a burning question they have for teaching in Fall 2020
- something else for the good of the group

And the follow-up "meeting" could be either text or video, or a combination of both. The same kind of limited timing would apply -- just a few weeks' commitment. The Stearns Center is hiring!

Conference Assistants: We're looking for 2-3 Conference Assistants/Interns for ITL 2020. We are seeking an assistant who is self-directed, outgoing, and interested in learning more about innovative teaching and learning at Mason. The purpose of these positions is to assist with transitioning the conference to an online format, preference is given to people who have advanced experience with virtual conference platforms (e.g., Zoom) and electronic journals.

The position will require 2-5 hours per week May through September 2020, with possible extension through the end of the fall 2020 semester or into spring 2021. All tasks may be completed remotely.

Faculty Fellow in STEM Digital Learning: We're looking for a faculty member to spend 5-10 hours per week this year supporting STEM faculty and creating course development resources for STEM-related online education. "New Normal" Faculty Consultants: Stearns Center has a few stipended (\$500-\$1000) positions this fall for faculty who are teaching in one of the new course modalities -- Face-to-face, Face-to-face-with-web-streaming, Face-to-face hybrid (half in class Tuesday, half in class Thursday), Synchronous web-conferencing (50-100% via Zoom or Collaborate) -- or teaching online in one of the more-challenging online-asynchronous fields, such as languages, arts, labs, practice, or field courses.

You don't have to be an expert in the new pedagogies to be a Consultant -- just an experienced teacher with an understanding of pedagogical strategies and an interest in supporting other faculty. Consultants would help design webinars and other online resources, join our office hours, and/or coach small groups of faculty for 1-2 hours per week this fall.
