OPPORTUNITY: Seeking Special Session Conveners for Next Year's ITL Conference

It wouldn't be the Innovations in Teaching & Learning (ITL) conference if we didn't mix things up a little bit each year. Some of our most successful and popular sessions at this year's online ITL conference opened with a series of short lightning talks (2-5 mins) by instructor presenters followed by a roundtable discussion or breakout group activity. With no end to the pandemic in sight, we're exploring including a featured collection of showcase sessions like this (on our most requested and popular topics) as part of the conference program next year. We are looking for people interested in leading a group of conference attendees to learn more about the topic from the session speakers (that we will help you recruit) and each other. Special session conveners are also eligible to be one of the speakers in the session.

Teaching Squares Return in February

Application Deadline: Tuesday, January 26, 2021

What do other faculty actually *do* in their courses? How are they adapting to new opportunities, engaging their students, providing feedback, managing their time, and supporting long-term learning? If you joined a Teaching Square, you could find out!

Stearns Center Teaching Squares are a kind of professional "pot-luck dinner": a quick way to build your teaching network and learn strategies that will support your teaching. For Spring 2021, we

will match interested faculty with a Square of colleagues from across the university (usually four people, but sometimes a little larger or smaller) and guide you through a quick four-part approach in February:

- Each Square meets once at the start of the month for introductions and planning
- Each member of the Square shares some element of a course they're currently teaching
- Each member provides reflective feedback to the others
- The whole Square meets for a conversation about what they've learned and how they can support one another further

CDP Online Course Essentials: Basic Questions about Accessibility and Usability in Online Courses

All learning begins with access. By making your online courses accessible, you provide educational opportunities to all students, including students with disabilities. Quality online courses focus on accessibility and usability, including clear and logical navigation, readability, and alternative access to materials. In our webinar, we will answer basic questions about accessibility – what it is; why it's important; and how can you make sure that your online course is accessible. Our webinar also highlights resources and services for accessibility available to Mason faculty from <u>Assistive</u> <u>Technology Initiative</u>. We also will demonstrate how to use Blackboard Ally, an accessibility tool available in all Mason Blackboard courses.

By the end of this webinar, participants will be able to: (a) Reflect on how accessibility and online course design relate to Universal Design for Learning (the why, what, and how of learning); (b) Explain how accessibility involves compliance with relevant disability laws and guidelines; (c) Apply methods to build and check for accessible content, e.g. using Ally; and (d) Develop a plan to incorporate accessibility as you design, build, and teach your online course at Mason.

Spring 2021 Faculty Learning Community: Teaching with Writing in the Mason Core

Spring 2021

This learning community is designed to support faculty who teach with writing in the Mason Core. It combines five self-directed online modules with development workshops and peer collaboration. Modules will focus broadly on using writing to enhance reading and promote critical thinking while also discussing practical strategies for concerns like how to provide effective and efficient feedback. By the end of the community, participants should have new activities and strategies ready to support their course's learning goals. Each module runs over a two week period, and participants will meet five times for approximately 1.5 hours during each module.

University Libraries

Update from the Libraries: Elsevier Journal Access

As previously announced, Virginia's seven public academic research libraries are in negotiations with Elsevier, a leading publisher in STEM and Social Sciences. Our shared Elsevier contract represents a collective yearly expenditure of \$10 million, and over \$1 million for Mason. Given substantial budget cuts and ongoing fiscal uncertainty, Virginia universities are seeking a substantial cost reduction for 2021. If we cannot reach a more affordable and sustainable arrangement through negotiations, we will be forced to reduce our Elsevier journal subscriptions (potentially as early as January 1, 2021). We want to assure all faculty that they will still have access to Elsevier articles. In some cases, the mode of access will change, but the Libraries will ensure that faculty continue to get the articles needed for their instruction or their research.
