Faculty are encouraged to make use of the Stearns Center's new <u>Digital Learning YouTube</u> <u>channel</u>. In addition to the Center's existing resources/information space, the channel's short videos are a good way of learning and reflecting on various "how-to-do" things—such as teaching online tips, instructional design, multimedia, and technology—without spending time on textheavy documents. Faculty can also use these Mason-specific videos without using or referencing other external links.
